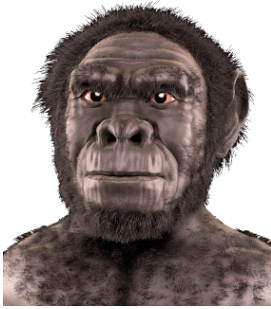

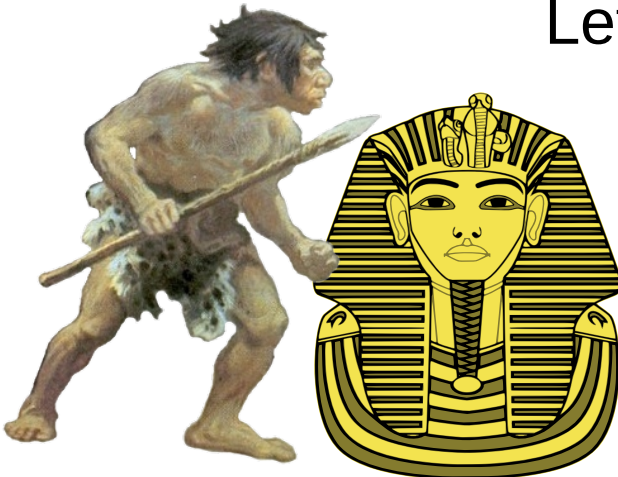
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Introduction

Let's look at some older ones.

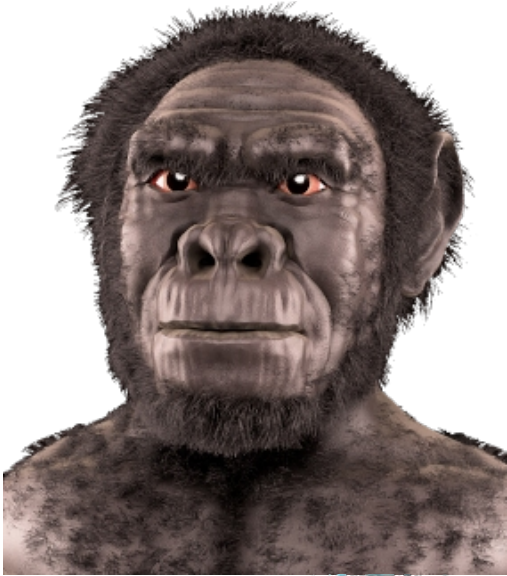
Introduction continued

Handy Man



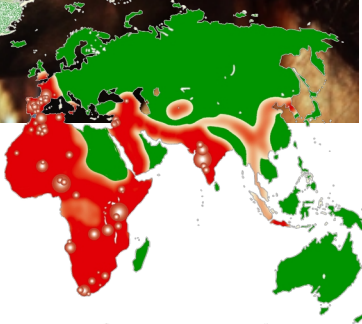

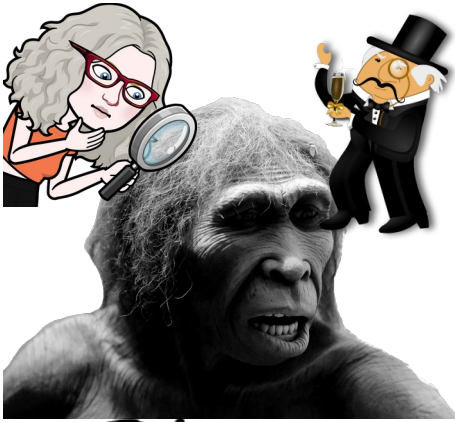
Randy Man
